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
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Subject: A1(3) The Chief Executive (CE) is appointed by the CPG. He is accountable to both the CPG and the HKSAR

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

- 1. According to the maturity of Hong Kong people in conducting politics responsibly and sensibly.
- 2. It depends on the democracy apatite of HK people.

For point 1, I feel that Hong Kong is very matured for universal suffrage -- in any case, we will be more so by 2007-08.

For point 2, this was clearly demonstrated in the recent two demonstrations in July 2003 and January 2004 as well as the high turn-out in the 2003 election exercise.

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






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Subject:A2(2) How 'gradual and orderly progress' should be understood

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

By 2007-08, universal suffrage should take care of this aspect and, like all other well-tried democracy models, should represent all sectors of society automatically. Regards

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
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






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Subject: A3(2) 'Facilitate the development of the capitalist economy'
