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While public views on the issues of principle and legislative process relating to constitutional development as laid down in the Basic Law

very important, the most important point that the Constitutional Development

Task Force has to work hard is find a way to educate the public to

use their votes to express their choice of the Chief Executive and LegCo

Members. This is because ultimately the people of Hong Kong have to cast

their votes. If they are well educated and know how to use their voting

power, the future of Hong Kong is bright and the pace of democracy can

accelerated. On the contrary, if Hong Kong people are immature and use their votes irrationally, it is difficult for the Chinese Government to feel

confident enough to give Hong Kong people more democracy. It is also

interest of the Chinese Government to properly educate the people of Hong

Kong so that election results would be rational and hard-line action against

some views of Hong Kong people would be unecessary.

The recent presidential election in Taiwan is a good example. It is irrational for so many voters to place so much weight on the identity of the

candidate (i.e., whether or not the candidate is an indigenous people of

Taiwan) when they cast their votes. On the contrary, Chen Shui-ben s

administration achievement which attributed to the economic downturn in the

past 4 years did not appear to be given their proper weight.

In Hong Kong, some local politicians are trying to learn from Chen his election techniques. If local politicians just concentrate on election (by

pleasing their voters with short term benefits, e.g., tax cuts, improved

social benefit, etc.) and neglect their primary role in administration

legislation, it would be a disaster for Hong Kong. It is widely understood

that grass-root voters are more easily affected by emotion when they

their votes. Education on democracy is, therefore, needed so as to prevent

such "politicians from being elected and to allow those who are doing for

the long term benefit of Hong Kong although they might cause short term

to their voters to be elected, e.g., reduce unreasonable social benefit.

increasing rental of public housing flats, widening the tax base, etc.


If Hong Kong is seen to favour electing such short-sighted CE and LegCo members and views of the middle class are not fully reflected in the Legislature, many Hong Kong people would be forced to leave Hong Kong.
