主旨: Proposal for 2007 CEO Election

Dear Honorable Mr. Tsang,

I am writing to raise my humble proposal for the 2007 CEO election in responding to the kind gestures of the Chinese authority to the Hong Kong people and myself recently.

I suggest that the poll of the election of 2007 be extended to all those possessing either first degree or post graduate degree and professional qualifications subject to public debates. I hope this intermediate proposal could provide a possible solution and outlet to the present dilemma situation between the Chinese authority and the massive Hong Kong people demonstrated in the July 1 Rally.

For the 2008 Legco election, I have no special proposal as I want to remain neutral between the political parties. But I insist that the Standing Committee of the People's Congress have no rights to specify the proportion of the directed elected members and the functional Constituencies elected members. If she really wants to do it, she has to go through the normal Basic Law amendment procedures, i.e. 2/3 of the Hong Kong People's Congress members, 2/3 of the Legco members and the consent of the CEO.

I am not picking the bone from the egg but this is an implication of how serious the Chinese authority is in honoring the Basic Law and will not abuse or breach the Basic Law at any time she wants in the future.

If there are any reasons that the Chinese authority really cannot give way to it, she has to, or must at least, give some sort of guarantees that this kind of abuse will not happen in the future so the Hong Kong people plus the international community really have the confidence that the Basic Law could really be implemented and honored in a serious and solemn manner.

For myself, I have no intention to change my status, so please do not reveal my identity. I will contribute what I can, if the SAR still welcome it, as and when required, provided that the Chinese authority is continuously kind to the Hong Kong people.
